Transfer Planning Guide – GENERAL EDUCATION
 Use in tandem with CC-MO general transfer guide

All grades must be a “C” or better for transfer

Students are recommended to have completed the AA or AS.

Communications:	ENG 121, ENG 122, CMM 121
Mathematics:	follow CLC general education requirements ¹
Physical/Life Sciences:	follow CLC general education requirements
Humanities/Fine Arts:	PHI 125, follow CLC general education requirements
Social/Behavioral Sciences:	6 hours: (include HST 121 or 122): HST 121, 122, 221, 222; additional course not HST

If completing less than 36 hours or the AAS, the following courses will meet requirements for CC-MO.

General Education:

- ENG 121, 122
- CIT 120
- CMM 121
- MTH 122 or higher course (MTH 140/141 not eligible)
- 6 hours: (include HST 121 or 122): HST 121, 122, 221, 222
- Arts/Humanities (6 hours): select from: ART 121; (ART 240 or HUM 121 or 122)², (ART 241 or 242); ENG 223, 225, 226, 228², 229, 241, 243, 244²; MUS 224; PHI 121, 122, 221²; SPA 121, 122
- Social/Behavioral (6 hours): ANT (121 or 221 or 222) ²; ECO (110 or 221)², 222; GEG (121 or 122 or 123) ², PSC 121; PSY 121; SOC 121²
- PHI 125
- Science/Math: 5 hours³: additional MTH and/or select from: (BIO 111 or 161), BIO 120, (CHM 120 or 121), (ESC⁴ 120 or 121 or 140), (PHY 111 or 121)

¹MTH 140/141: This course will meet the CC-MO math general education requirement only if the AA/AS is completed. However, an additional math course at CC-MO will likely be required in order to meet prerequisites for many CC-MO courses, particularly business courses. See specific major transfer planning guide for more details.
